It was prepared by the Council following consultation with parish residents and will be used to guide the work of the Council over the next few years.



About the Parish

Whittingham Parish has a long history. It was mentioned in the Domesday Book published in 1086 and its name is believed to have derived from 'Hwita', the leader of an Angle tribe, 'Ingas', the name of the tribe, and 'ham', meaning the home of the tribe.

Originally a small, rural parish, the area was transformed in 1873 by the opening of a large psychiatric hospital which had over 3,000 patients at its peak. The hospital area housed staff as well as patients, had its own workshops, and became to a large extent, a self-contained community.

The present day parish is nearly 130 years old. It sits about seven miles north of Preston city centre and runs largely east-west from the M6 motorway to the Longridge boundary. It adjoins Goosnargh Parish to the north and Haighton and Grimsargh parishes to the south.



The heart of the parish is the village green, hall, pub, school and church which sit at the centre of the area. Although technically parts of the area are in Goosnargh Parish, the area is generally referred to by residents as Goosnargh and we have maintained this usage. The Cumeragh and Halfpenny Lane areas are also increasingly important.

The parish, together with neighbouring parishes, has seen significant residential growth in recent years with the development of many new properties. This has been driven largely by speculative developers and many residents believe the scale of building has now becoming excessive and unsustainable, with little evidence for local demand on this scale.

There is a strong wish that, as far as possible, the parish with the village at its heart, should be protected to ensure that it maintains its rural village feel. This, in its broadest sense, forms a major theme of this plan.

Residents Priorities

As part of developing this plan, we consulted with Parish residents on their priorities for the area in 2022. Residents top priorities were as follows:

Overall Vision	 to keep the parish and the village rural, and a nice place to live. to limit local development to local needs as far as possible, to ensure an appropriate supporting infrastructure for existing developments, to avoid infrastructure projects that will drive further unwanted development.
Environment	to press Planning Authorities to require new builds to comply with the building standards that exist when building starts, rather than those which applied when permission was given. This will ensure that developers cannot land bank for long periods of time and
Recreation, Sport and Leisure	 then build at lower standards than currently apply. provide support for the Bowling Club, Cricket Club and similar groups, provide play facilities for under 5s on the village green provide support for a new building for youth organisations.
Culture, Community and Services	ensure a regular police presence in the parish.
Education, Training and Employment	 ensure local schools can favour local access. get a new primary school built on the old hospital site.
Transport	 improve the condition of parish roads. Reduce speeding in the village area.
Housing	 find ways of ensuring Planning Conditions imposed as part of planning permissions are properly enforced. ensure Preston' Council's next Development Plan is explicit about the volume, location and intended timescales of any new developments to be permitted in the parish and surrounding areas. ensure the plan says specifically whit is special about villages so that planning applications can be tested against these criteria. find ways of preventing change of use / scope /scale of developments after planning permission has been granted. Find ways to limit planning development to meet local levels of demand rather than for speculative development.

The Vision

Following the consultation, our overall vision for the parish is as follows:

- We want the parish to feel like one community, regardless of where people live.
- Where people naturally look to neighbouring areas because of where they live, we still want them to feel part of the Whittingham parish and hopefully feel fondly towards it.
- We want it to feel inclusive for everyone, non-cliquey, and easy to become involved.
- We want the parish to be an attractive place, somewhere we can all be proud of and enjoy.
- We want to make the village the beating heart of the parish, vibrant and active, and a place that nurtures the spirit.
- Across the parish we want to limit development to local need as far as we can, minimise traffic growth and speed, prevent the loss of green space, and minimise noise and dust.
- In short, we want to keep the parish and the village a nice place to live.
- We recognise the need for supporting infrastructure to support current and recently approved development plans.
- We want to make sure this is delivered as promised and in a timely fashion and we want to make sure that this does not then drive further unwanted development.
- We want the people of the parish to feel informed about what is going on and to be able to properly influence and shape the future of the area.
- And we want people to stand up and be counted, to get involved and to help deliver this
 overall vision.

As a Parish Council we have limited legal powers and we caveat the aims of this plan with the realism that the Parish Council is a small body of just seven volunteer councillors and a supporting Parish Clerk.

We will do what we can directly.

We will also act as a catalyst to get residents and others with a legitimate interest in achieving the overall vision actively involved in campaigning and other activities that will be needed to deliver the parish and village we all want to see.

Question numbers in the tables refer to the original discussion draft. Scores are from the consultation with residents. They are not intended to be sequential or include all numbers.


